VARIETY	SIZE	MATURE SIZE	DESCRIPTION
CONIFERS			
Arborvitae, Techny Tr.	12" - 18"	10-15 ft.	Evergreen compact, broad-based, conical-pyramidal tree that is noted for its rich dark green foliage that does not yellow in winter. Makes an excellent hedge plant and well suited for windbreaks.
Fir, Balsam Tr.	70-80 ft.	45-75 ft.	Slow-growing tree, growing no more than 12" annually. Trees feature a pyramid-like shape and soft, flat needles.
Pine, Red (Norway) Tr.	8" - 16"	50-70 ft.	Needles are 4" - 6" long, flexible and a dark yellow-green color. Grows at a moderate to fast rate in full/part sun. Prefers sandy/well drained soil.
Pine, White Tr.	8" - 16"	50-80 ft.	Bluish-green color needles are 3" - 5" long, very soft and flexible. It grows fast and prefers partial sun. Grows well in rich moist soil, but does best in moist sandy loams.
Spruce, White	8" - 16"	40-60 ft.	Needles are 1/3" - 3/4" long and blue-green in color. Hardy. Grows moderate rate in part sun/shade. Tolerant of hot dry summers. Can be grown in sandy soil, loam or clay.

DECIDUOUS TREES			
Apricot	12" - 18"	12-16 ft.	Hardy, fast growing tree requiring full sun. Leaves are broad and roundish, flowers are white to pink and open very early in the spring. Fruit ripens end of July to mid-August.
Black Walnut	12" - 18"	70-90 ft.	Tall with deeply fissured brown bark. Important timber tree. Fast growing. Prefers moist, well drained soils. Nuts eaten by squirrels, red and gray fox and humans.
Butternut	18"-24"	30-50 ft.	The twigs, leaf stems, and leaflets, especially in the early stages of growth, have sticky hairs. The flowers and leaves are produced in May. The edible nut ripens in October. Also, known as "white walnut." Grows best on stream banks and on well-drained soil.
Cherry, Black	18"-24"	50-75 ft.	It is perhaps most noted for its profuse spring bloom, attractive summer foliage and fall color. Fragrant white flowers in slender pendulous clusters appear with the foliage in spring. Flowers are followed by drooping clusters of small red cherries that ripen in late summer turning dark purple-black in September.
Cottonwood	8"-18"	75-100 ft.	Cottonwood is a rapid growing tree and becomes very large with age. Tree form is upright spreading with an oval to rounded crown. It is a good tree for highway and park plantings where little maintenance is possible.
Hackberry	18" - 24"	30-50 ft.	It has simple, elm-like leaves and can be identified by its many corky warts and ridges of bark on the trunk. It produces fruit in the form of 1/2" - 1" purple drupes that are an important food source for several wildlife species.
Hickory, Bitternut	8"-18"	50-70 ft.	Large tree native to north America best reserved for larger landscapes. Large, compound leaves that turn yellow in the fall. Develops a 1", 4-part nut. Prefers moist, well-drained acidic soil but can also grow in dry upland sites.
Linden, American (Basswood)	12" - 18"	70 ft.	American basswood is a stately and well formed deciduous tree with large heart-shaped leaves, a clean, straight trunk, and a broad, rounded crown. The trunk is straight, free of branches for a considerable height, and the bark is light brown and smooth, becoming darker and deeply furrowed on older trees. The flowers are pollinated by bees.
Maple, Sugar	18"-24"	60+ ft.	Sugar maple is often 80' or more tall with a trunk up to 3 ft. in diameter. It has a large, dense and rounded crown and is one of the giants of the forest. Deeply furrowed gray bark which turns almost black when wet. Sun to partial shade.
Oak, Red	6" -18"	75 ft.	A medium sized, deciduous tree with a rounded to broad-spreading, often irregular crown. Typically grows at a moderate-to-fast rate to a height of 50-75'. Leaves turn brownish-red in autumn.
Oak, Swamp White	18" - 24"	50-60 ft.	Medium sized, deciduous tree with a broad, rounded crown and a short trunk which typically grows at a moderate rate. Fall color is yellow, but sometimes reddish purple. Fruits are acorns which mature in early fall. Surprisingly drought tolerant.
Oak, White	12" -18"	60-80 ft.	Grows at a moderate rate in full sun and rich, well-drained soil. Produces sweet edible kernel. Excellent for wildlife and wood products.
SHRUBS			
Chokecherry	12" -18"	20-30 ft.	Small hardy tree or large shrub with egg-shaped leaves and dense, elongated, terminal white flower clusters. Fruits turn dark purple when ripe in July and August. Beneficial for wildlife.
Chokeberry, Black	12" -18"	3-6 ft.	Open, upright, spreading and somewhat rounded deciduous shrub. Features clusters of 5-petaled, white flowers in spring which are followed in early autumn by blackish purple, blueberry-sized fruits. Dark green foliage turns an attractive purplish red in autumn.
Currant, American Black	18"-24"	4-5 ft.	Upright shrub with yellowish-white flowers in May. Fruits are smooth black in July & August.
Dogwood, Gray	12" -18"	10-15 ft.	Prefers full sun or partial shade. Shrub features white flowers in terminal racemes in late spring and grayish-green, elliptic to lance-shaped leaves 2-4" long. Foliage turns dusky purplish red in fall.
Dogwood, Silky	12"-18"	6-10 ft.	Full sun to part shade. Shrub has white, greenish-white or yellow flower clusters in the spring and blue and white fruit in the fall. This plant tolerates poorly drained soils. Provides food and habitat for birds and other wildlife.
Elderberry	12"-18"	5-12 ft.	Shrub occurring in rich soil scattered through bottomlands and uplands. Stems have a thin woody layer and large white pith. Flowers form in spring in an umbel and are aromatic. Fruit is consumed by many birds and other wildlife; also a good addition to pollinator habitat.
Indigo, False	12" -18"	6-20 ft.	Shrub does well with part shade or full sun. Fragrant foliage has compound pinnate leaves typical of the Pea family, attractive to butterflies. Flowers are 1/3-inch wide, purple-blue with orange anthers on 3-6 inch upright spikes.
Nannyberry	12"-18"	12-15 ft.	Large growing native shrub that produces 2-3 inch clusters of white flowers in the spring. Mature fruit are black in color. Fall color is deep maroon to red.
Plum, Wild	8"-18"	12-20 ft.	Can be included in farmstead and field windbreaks, as well as wildlife and recreational plantings. The plum furnishes both good habitat and food for wildlife, as the plants mature and form a thicket.
Serviceberry (Juneberry)	12"-18"	4-13 ft.	Leaves broad-oval 1-2" long. Flowers in April and May, 5-15 flowered upright racemes. Fruit matures to a purple-black color. Shrub is beneficial for food and habitat to birds, wildlife and pollinators.
