VARIETY	MATURE HEIGHT	DESCRIPTION
CONIFERS		
Arborvitae, American	40-80 ft.	Variety of white cedar. Excellent for windbreaks. Prefers moist soils and partial to full sun.
Fir, Balsam	45-75 ft.	Slow growing tree that prefers full sun and moist soils. Prefers moist soils and full sun, but is shade tolerant.
Pine, Red (Norway)	50-120 ft.	The Minnesota State tree. Thrives in sandy loam or dry upland soils and prefers full sun.
Pine, White	80-120 ft.	Grows best in well-drained upland soils. Partially shade tolerant but prefers full sun.
Spruce, Black	20-70 ft.	Common in northern Minnesota in wet, boggy areas. Prefers moist to wet soils and full sun.
Spruce, Norway	50-80 ft.	Prefers full sun. Sports large cones and upturned branches.
Spruce, White	40-60 ft.	Medium to large sized conifer which prefers sun to light shade and does well in upland settings.
DECIDUOUS TREES		
Aspen, Quaking	60-100 ft.	A pioneer species, also known as the Trembling Aspen. Prefers sun to partial shade and grows in upland settings.
Birch, Paper	50-70 ft.	A native tree which grows relatively quickly. Prefers sun to partial shade and thrives in cool, moist soils.
Birch, River	40-70 ft.	Prefers partial shade to full sun. Does well in moist soils and lowland settings.
Cherry, Black	50-75 ft.	Does well in partial to full shade. Moderately fast growing with clusters of small, edible fruit.
Hackberry	40-75 ft.	Prefers partial to full sun and moderately moist soils. Frequently found along riverbanks and in floodplains. The berries ripen in September and may provide food for many species of wildlife throughout the winter.
Linden, American	60-100 ft.	Also commonly known as a Basswood, these trees tend to prefer moist soils and are shade tolerant.
Maple, Rubrum	40-65 ft.	Also known as a red maple, these trees are moderately fast growing and shade tolerant.
Maple, Sugar	60+ ft.	Slow growing tree that often reaches great heights. Does well in eastern parts of the state in moist, rich soils. Shade tolerant.
Oak, Red	75+ ft.	Red oaks typically do well in the rich soils of southeast Minnesota. They are moderately shade tolerant and tend to be fast growing.
Oak, Swamp White	50-65 ft.	Often found growing in river bottoms, this tree thrives in moist soils, is slow growing and shade tolerant.
Oak, White	60-80 ft.	Grows at a slow to moderate rate in full sun and rich, well drained soil. Provides a food source for many wildlife species.
Walnut, Black	90-100 ft.	Does well in sun to partial shade. Tends to grow in bottomlands and moist hillsides. May grow rapidly in good soil.
SMALL TREES & SHRUBS		
Crabapple, Red Splendor	15-20 ft.	Produces beautiful rosy red flowers and small red fruit that attract birds and cling to trees into the winter.
Cranberry, Highbush	8-12 ft.	Produces white flowers in May to middle of June, and bright bunches of red berries in August. Does well in partial shade and in moist soils.
Dogwood, Redosier	3-8 ft.	Small shrub blooming May-August. Does well in part shade, sun; open wetlands. Flowers provide food source for a variety of pollinators. Stems are reddish green during the growing season becoming deep red in dormant season.
Hazelnut	4-16 ft.	Hazelnuts grow in a variety of environments and produces edible nuts for humans and wildlife alike.
Elderberry	5-12 ft.	This shrub prefers rich soil. Dark fruit attracts many bird and mammals. Fruit widely used to make wines and jellies.
Lilac, Common Purple	8-12 ft.	Produces clusters of grafrant purple flowers in mid-spring that attract pollinator species.
Ninebark, Common	6-10 ft.	Produces small white or pink flowers in late spring, which give way to clusters of reddish fruit. Prefers sun to partial shade.
Plum, American	12-20 ft.	Attracts a wide variety of wildlife. Fruit ripens in early summer and are well suited for preserves and jellies.
Serviceberry (Juneberry)	15-25 ft.	Smaller tree that blooms early, April-May, good for pollinators. Dark purplish-red fruit is used by humans and wildlife. Shrubs provide nesting habitat for birds. Leaves turn red in fall.
