VARIETY	SIZE	MATURE SIZE	DESCRIPTION	
CONIFERS		-		
Pine, White	7"-15"	50-80 ft.	Bluish-green color needles 3" - 5" long, very soft and flexible. It grows fast and prefers partial sun. Grows well in rich moist soil, but does best in moist sandy loams.	
Fir, Balsam	12"-18"	45-75 ft.	Slow growing tree, growing no more than 12" annually. Trees feature a pyramid-like shape and soft, flat needles.	
Pine, Red (Norway)	7"-15"	50-70 ft.	Needles 4" - 6" long, flexible and a dark yellow-green color. Grows at a moderate to fast rate in full/part sun. Prefers sandy/well drained soil.	
Spruce, White	7"-15"	40-60 ft.	Medium to large sized conifer which prefers sun to light shade and has slender braches.	
Spruce, Norway	7"-15"	50-80 ft.	arge, pyramidal tree with long, cylindrical cones that hang like ornaments from the weeping branches against the dark green foliage. This sun-loving tree is ften used as windbreaks, screens, or hedges in large-scale landscapes.	
Cedar, White	5"-12"	40-50 ft.	excellent for windbreaks. Prefers moist soils and partial to full sun.	
DECIDUOUS				
Tamarck, American	5"-12"	40-70 ft.	A deciduous conifer also know as a Larch. It prefers wet soil, natively lived in bogs and wetlands. Turn bright vibrant yellow in fall before shedding its needles.	
Aspen, Quaking	12"-18"	40-50 ft.	A fast growing tree with smooth greenish white bark. Can grow in partial shade and is able to create many new sprouts from its root system. Do not plant near spectic systems.	
Birch, Paper	12"-18"	50-70 ft.	A native tree which grows relatively quickly. White bark peels off into strips. Prefers sun to partial shade.	
Birch, River	18"-24"	40-70 ft.	Leaves turn a golden yellow in the fall. Seeds attract many birds. Prefers sun to partial shade.	
Cherry, Black	12"-18"	50-75 ft.	It is perhaps most noted for its profuse spring bloom, attractive summer foliage and fall color. Fragrant white flowers in slender pendulous clusters appear with the foliage in spring. Flowers are followed by drooping clusters of small red cherries that ripen in late summer turning dark purple-black in September.	
Hackberry	12"-18"	30-50 ft.	Prefers full sun and moist soils. Purple fruits tend to hang on the tree during winter months and will attract birds.	
Hickory, Bitternut	6"-12"	50-70 ft.	Long, clear trunk with a broad spreading crown. Natively grow in low woods along streams, river bottoms and the base of moist slopes and cliffs. Highgly prized as fuel for making hickory smoked meats and barbecue charcoal.	
Maple, Red	12"-18"	60-90 ft.	These trees are moderately fast growing and shade tolerant.	
Maple, Sugar	5"-12"	60+ ft.	Sugar maple is often 80' or more tall with a trunk up to 3 ft. in diameter. It has a large, dense and rounded crown and is one of the giants of the forest. Deeply furrowed gray bark which turns almost black when wet. Sun to partial shade.	
Oak, Red	12"-18"	75+ ft.	Medium sized tree , typically growing at a medium rate. Leaves will turn brownish red in the fall. Will produce acorns at maturity.	
Oak, Swamp White	18"-24"	65 ft.	Bark is thick, deeply and irregulalry divided by fissures, grayish brown color. Leaves are dark green and shiny above, grayish and fuzzy beneath turning brow in fall. The nut provides a food source to wildlife. Requires moist soils, moderately shade tolerant and slow growing.	
Oak, White	18"-24"	60-80 ft.	Grows at a moderate rate in full sun and rich, well-drained soil. Produces sweet edible kernel. Excellent species for wildlife and wood products.	
Oak, Bur	6"-12"	50-80 ft.	A slow growing tree with a coarsely textured crown that offers dense shade. The acorns it produces are popular with the wildlife.	
Walnut, Black	9"-12"	70-90 ft.	Tall with deeply fissured brown bark. Important timber tree. Fast growing. Prefers moist, well drained soils. Nuts eaten by squirrels, red and gray fox and humans.	
SMALL TREES & SHRUBS				
Cranberrybush	12"-18"	8-12 ft.	Produces white flowers in May to middle of June, and bright bunches of red berries in August.	
Crabapple, Red Splendour	12"-18"	15-20 ft.	Produces beautiful rosy red flowers and small red fruit that attract birds and cling to trees into the winter.	
Dogwood, Red Osier	12"-18"	3-8 ft.	Small shrub blooming May-August. Does well in part shade, sun; open wetlands. Flowers provide food source for a variety of pollinators. Stems are reddish green during the growing season becoming deep red in dormant season. Leaves turn shades of red, orange and yellow in the fall. Fruit is a round, white berry-like drupe.	
Elderberry	12"-18"	5-12 ft.	This shrub prefers rich soil. Dark fruit attracts many bird and mammas. Fruit widely used to make wines and jellies.	
Hazelnut, American	12"-18"	8-12 ft.	Hazelnuts grow in a variety of environments and produces edible nuts for humans and wildlife alike.	
Lilac, Common Purple	12"18"	12-15 ft	A popular shrub with sweet smelling flowers that bloom in mid to late spring. Extremely hardy and thrives with little care.	
Ninebark, Common	12"-18"	6-10 ft.	Produces small white or pink flowers in late spring, which give way to clusters of reddish fruist. Prefers sun to partial shade.	
Plum, American	12"-18"	12-20 ft.	Attracts a wide variety of wildlife. Fruit ripens in early summer and are best suited for preserves and jellies.	
Serviceberry (Juneberry)	18"-24"	15-25 ft.	Large group of small trees or shrubs that dot woodlands, meadows and roadsides. Blooms early, April-May, good for pollinators. Dark purplish-red fruit is used by humans and wildlife. Shrubs provide nesting habitat for birds. Leaves turn red in fall.	
Willow, Flame	12-18"	15-20 ft.	Large ornamental shrub with bright reddish, orange stems. Rapidly grows at a rate of 4 to 8ft a year.	
Buffaloberry	12-24"	6-20 ft	A mound shaped shrub with twigs that are spiny and silvery hray. Berries are edible but sour.
